	<p>Queen of Angels Church, on the wooden structure behind the altar, near where the priest sits.</p>	<p>The <b>phoenix</b> or firebird is a legendary creature said to have a life-cycle in which it dies in flames and is then reborn from the ashes. (Yes, like Fawkes in <i>Harry Potter</i>.) This points to the story of Jesus' true resurrection from the dead.</p> <p>The phoenix is also a symbol of Chicago, because of our recovery and growth after the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. The Archdiocese of Chicago has a phoenix on its crest and flag.</p>
	<p>Queen of Angels Church, during the Easter season, along the east (rectory) side of the church near the piano and the Sacred Heart statue.</p>	<p>At Easter time, the church is full of lilies and other flowers which express the joy of the resurrection.</p>
	<p>Queen of Angels Church, window in the Apostles Adoration Chapel, the room behind the statue of Mary. The window has text and symbols from the Apostle's Creed.</p>	<p>Jesus emerges from the tomb, waving a flag of victory (white with a red cross, like the flags used later by the Roman emperor Constantine in his Jesus-inspired victory). An angel looks on and a Roman guard shields his eyes from the radiant sight.</p>
